\_ HIGH SIERRA CLIMBER 'S GUIDE OUT \_

The long-awaited new edition of A Climber's Guide to the High Sierra, by Steve Roper, in Sierra Club Totebook format, is now on sale. Roper restored the technical routes, which (much to the rage of the technical climbing world) had been omitted from Andy Smatke's 1972 "Mountaineer's Guide" to make space for countless walk-ups (some of which won't be found in this edition!)

Unlike many guidebooks, this one lists first ascents in a special section in the back of the book, rather than under route descriptions — not entirely satisfactory, as routes are frequently identified in climbers minds by the persons who first climbed them rather than by compass and geography. However, it will be a pleasure to many to have a complete guidebook more up-to-date than the out-of-print 1965 edition.

## RCS MINARETS TRIP \*\* 3-5 July 1976

Climbers and assorted camp followers met at the Agnew Meadows trailhead on Saturday morning. The hike in to camp was quite leisurely, in accordance with hallowed RCS tradition. We noted that a couple of the small streams which usually flow at least until September were completely dry. The leader's habitual search for the log crossing of the San Joaquin could have been avoided since the water was so low that judicious use of the larger pebbles at the trail crossing now gets one across without wetting a toe.

By early afternoon everyone was established in camps distributed about the west shore of Lake Ediza. The Lake Ediza mosquitos appear to be suffering from this year's drought; few of us could hit more than one per slap. The afternoon saw sporadic climbing activity on the little cliff west of the lake.

In late afternoon a great whooping and hollering arose from the woods. This was followed at some length by the Wilts; Chuck, Ellen, Janet and Gail (Field). They had gone in Friday and climbed Dawson Minaret on Saturday.

That evening we were paid a visit by the local ranger, who seemed very favorably disposed toward climbers. The Forest Service does not now have any quotas for the Minarets Wilderness, but the ranger said quotas will be established in a year or two.

Sunday was the climbing day. Parties were on Dawson, Bedayan, Clyde and Leonard Minarets. Andy Fried and Bob Samoano reported finding a very large fossil high on the Eastern face of Clyde. This was a surprise since the Ritter Range is composed primarily of metamorphic and igneous rocks.

On this day, as on the other two days, the weather was superb...Warm sun and gentle breeze. Also there was a nice moon to assist your correspondent and his party back to camp at an outrageous hour.

#### BALDY HUT VANDALIZED

Sometime between July 5th and 9th the San Antonio Ski Hut was broken into. It appeared they used an ax, or some other heavy tool, and attacked the siding surrounding the shuttered window (the one which converts to a glass window which swings away). Some vandalism inside was noted, and some things were taken, though nothing of monetary value. A half gallon of red wine was taken from one of the lockers. Apparently as a lark, many window panes were broken.

At the May work party the whole front yard area of the Hut was reworked. The trail from the front step was rerouted north to join the summit trail near the creek, hopefully to keep those heading for the peak going in that direction instead of stopping at the Hut to fill canteens and congregate at the front steps. The front yard water pipe was buried and covered with rocks, many of them good-sized, which took four strong backs most of the day to accomplish. The vandals managed to heft most of the rocks and send them down the hill,, in an apparent attempt to uncover the water pipe (which they did).

Immediate first aid repairs were administered the weekend of July 10-11, and most of the remainder of the work was finished on the 17-18th, thanks to Steve Wilkie, Jim Powers, Virgil Bayless, Milt McAuley, and several others. TAHQUITZ MYSTERY UNRAVELED

In revealing the true circumstances of her romantic introduction to John Mendenhall at Tahquitz in 1938, Ruth has solved a mystery of longstanding. In June Mugelnoos, Ruth states she first met John at the base of Fingertip Traverse, and then they made an early attempt at Traitor Horn. As everyone knows, there is a weatherbeaten sprig of mistletoe tied on by thoroughly rusted bailing wire (looks to have been there for 30 years or so) in the big oak tree at the base of Fingertrip Traverse (the tree that's infested with red ants which bite you while you're anchored to it belaying the leader on the first pitch). # EXPLORATORY EXPEDITION SUCCESSFUL

Jim Endo, LeRoy Russ and Emory Y ount just completed a week-long trip to the fringes of the Sierra in search of new climbing areas. One full day was spent in the Buttermilk Country near Bishop. This is a good plactice climbing area, similar to Joshua Tree. One day was spent at Fresno Dome east of Fish Camp. The dome is clean granite, like Tahquitz, and should be scheduled for an RCS trip. We did a four-pitch route that's worth repeating - an open book near the east edge of the dome. One day was used to inspect the Balls, a series of granite domes east of Fresno Dome. The Balls consists of half a dozen or so domes and pinnacles with one low wall over half a mile long; the area is recommended for RCS trips. Access to either Fresno Dome or the Balls is by the road from Bass Lake. The road east from Fish Camp is a dog; five stream crossings.

Prussik Knot Jams Again

On July 5th, while rappelling from the usual belay stand, 50 feet below the summit of Mt. Clarence King, the first climber to descend found his self-belay prussik jammed. Once again, the middle-marker of tape had not passed the knot. As the American Alpine Club admonishes - "Don't use tape!" GRD

## MOUNTAIN WATER CONTAMINATION

The problem of bacterial contamination of mountain streams is less clearly tied to the sanitary wastes of campers than one might expect. Surprisingly, it was recently found that a watershed in Montana which was closed to the public for several years, had five times the amount of bacterial contaminationism its streams than an adjacent watershed which was open to the public.\* Fruthermore, when the previously-protected watershed was open to the public in 1970, the amount of bacteria in its streams was found to decrease. The scientists involved in the study tied the bacterial contamination to the bear and elk population in the protected watershed area. This suggests the totally non-scientific observation that although people tend to head for the bushes when nature calls, our wildlife friends don't feel obligated to do the same. It seems that the absense of man doesn't necessarily guarantee the bacterial purity of mountain streams, and that it might be wise to add populous game areas to the list of bacteria-

Bodies of Two Lost in Storm are Recovered


Bodies of two men lost in Sierra snowstorms in late February were found Wednesday, June 16.

The body of Kenneth German, 34, of Mountain View was recovered in the area of Matterhorn Peak, west of Bridgepost, by June Lake Search and Rescue with the assistance of the Forest Service helicopter. Berman was reported missing by two hiking companions who said he was apparently hit by an avalanche Feb. 21 while hiking near the 10,000 ft. level.

A body believed to be that of Robert Frieswald, 28, of Santa Monica, was found by Mammoth Mt. Ski area personnel near the old Reds Meadow dump in Madera county. He had been missing since Sunday, Feb. 29 when he failed to return from an afternoon of skiing. A heavy storm hit the area that afternoon, and some 50 inches of new snow blanketed the area. 
