TAHQUITZ -- AUGUST 13-14

Two days of perfect weather to climb with many friends, old and new. Twenty-eight people signed in Saturday and twenty-three on Sunday. Among the pleasant surprises were Ken McNutt, whose name was on the sign-up sheet as a "guest" for Sunday's climb(Ken is a former RCS chairman and held many RCS and SC positions), a lovely dinner Saturday night with Judith Fairchild, who had just returned from a summer in Yosemite Valley climbing and working at the hospital, and Warren Harding, who swapped stories, jokes, beer, and swordfish steaks with us until midnight.

TAHQUITZ -- SEPTEMBER 17-18

The scheduled trip to Tahquitz Rock over Saturday and Sunday, September 17-18, attracted record numbers of climbers, who enjoyed perfect, slightly fallish weather over the entire weekend. There were 38 climbers in all, including 23 RCS members, 9 students and 6 guests. A total of 53 climbs were made on eighteen routes--nine on Fingertip, seven on the Maiden, five on Frightful Variation and four on the Left Ski Track. The most notable accomplishments were by Steve Kinney and Brian Parker on Shit 4 Brains, El Camino Real, Lower Arch (free) and Passover--mostly 5.9 and above. I'm told that their performance on Lower Arch and Passover was almost past belief.

99 PITCHES TO CLIMB ON THE WALL, 99 PITCH ES -elad a la-gaTO CLIMB

Discontent with simply reading about big Yosemite climbs, weekend climbers Leroy Russ and myself mobilized our forces toward the North Buttress of the Middle Cathedral Rock (Grade V) late Friday AM, September 23. Scare stories from our best information sources indicated that this route has claimed excessive wear and tear on haul bags and climbers who were of less than superman stature. So, our strategy was to carry all water, food and bivy gear in packs and move at a comfortable steady pace.

The first few pitches required scrambling up grungey downward-sloping ledges which provided a great opportunity for dumping miniature rock slides in the face of the second person on the rope. A couple of 5.7 cracks among these pitches gave some dredibility to this first portion of the climb. By the time we had reached the right Rabbit Ear, my climbing efforts had primarily been concentrated on getting us off route and in creating immense tangles in our two ropes. With daylight getting short, I led up the next pitch to fix a rope for the next day. Working my way into an awkward 5.9 lieback, I sought the powers of the Six-Million-Dollar Man but only managed to take one of his 30 foot leaps in the direction of gravity.

Saturday began with an exchange of whoops and hollers from a party on El Capitan and a memorable jumar ascent through a squeeze chimney with packs. After several more pitches of free, aid, and off-route climbing, the long shadows on the valley floor told us to bivy soon. Resigned and somewhat discouraged because of our slow movement up to route, the comfort of our bivouac ledge was quite welcome, but all peace was destroyed when Leroy's snores got out of hand. Noise abatement procedures were simple, a lew nate jumple and serenity returned to the valley. . . cont.

99 PITCHES TO CLIMB......cont.

Climbing on the following morning was initiated by a beautiful 5.8 lead over an arch by Leroy, and this swung us both into momentum for knocking off many pitches that day. By this time, the competition was getting heavy for being the belayer with the most tangles in the two ropes. My efforts early on the route set me far enough ahead to unquestionably earn the "spagnetti award" of the climb.

At mid-afternoon I found my touchiest lead. Too tired to confidently free climb a 5.7-5.8 loose lieback with a pack, I attempted to aid the rotten rock. But, upon standing on a creatively placed sky hook that was creeping out of a crack (with only a fixed piton 75% broken off that protected a 20 foot ledge fall), I found 5.7 free climbing a secure alternative.

Rock fall was also posing a serious problem, but my helmet was most useful when Leroy stepped out of a pitch of mixed free and aid climbing and dropped an etrier. Bullseye, the carabiner landed square on top my helmet and the etrier wound around my neck no less perfectly than a Hawaiian lei.

The climbing became intense, the sunlight short and the final pitches near. Exhausted and finally in moon light, we called the third bivouac with only three easy pitches remaining. Sleep came with difficulty due to a drop in temperature, gusty winds and thoughts of the climb. Monday's climbing was allowed to wait for the warmth of the sun to motivate our bodies. Dehydration had cost us our appetites and I weighed 12 pounds less than on Friday. The 2000 foot face had taken about 22 pitches of not necessarily the most enjoyable climbing but by far the most worthwhile climbing we had both undertaken
