MORE PERMITS REQUIRED FOR SIERRA

A Golden Trout Wilderness area has just been established on the Sequoia and Inyo National Forests according to Sequoia Forest Supervisor John A. Leasure. The Golden Trout Wilderness extends from Moses and Maggie Mountains near Porterville eastward to the Sierra Crest at Olancha Peak. The 306,000 acre area includes the Little Kern Basin, the northern part of the Kern Plateau and the southern part of the Inyo National Forest, adjacent to the John Muir Vilderness.

The new wilderness area is part of the
