# ALPINE SKI TOUR, LAUREL MOUNTAIN (non-scheduled) - May 7

8 climbers (2 separate parties) drove in about a mile on the Sherwin Creek Road from HWY 395, to where it was blocked by snow, and headed up Laurel Mountain on Sunday, May 7. Initially following the route of the Laurel Lakes Road, they then ascended the snow-free north ridge, crossed the head of a deep canyon draining north and continued on snow southwest to the summit (11,812), reached by 7 -- those who brought skis left them 600! below. In addition to the unusual clear beautiful weather and fantastic views of the snow-bureid Sierra, the skiers were rewarded with a 4000! ski descent on continuous Spring corn snow ranging from super to good. After retracing the route to the north ridge, they then skied directly down a fairly steep gully and across ½ mile of flat terrain to the cars. BJL

# ALPINE SKI TOUR, "HURRICANE" (THOMPSON) RIDGE - May 13-14

From the end of the opened road at Parcher's Camp, on a warm sunny Sat morning, 9 skiers (including the legendary Sy Ossofsky complete with home-made Ramer-type bindings) walked to South Lake, then donned skis to cross the lake and headed up to camp below Treasure Lakes at approx. 10,300'. An initial search for open water was successfully ended when one participant fell into a waist-deep hole; later on, a more convenient open stream was found about 100' south of camp. The Sat afternoon tour, to a new area for the SMS, was up a canyon to Lake 11,568' on the south side of Mt. Johnson. Thile 3 climbed the peak, 5 others climbed on skis up to a 12,600' col on the opposite side of the canyon before skiing down to camp on Spring-type snow which by lipm was somewhat heavy but still provided some enjoyable turns. The intensity of the wind had been increasing all afternoon and by evening was stron; enough to make cooking on a stove difficult; fortunately a dry spot and plenty of firewood were available for the evening campfire. The wind blew all night and all da Sunday with gusts up to 100 MPH. However, since the slopes leading to the summit of Pk. 13,323' ("Ski Mountaineers' Peak") mostly face east, the snow did soften and 5 reached the top on skis. The first 1000' of the ski descent was on heavy crusted snow but below 12,200' good Spring snow was encountered except for the last few hundred feet above camp, which was "mashed potatoes". This same type of snow was found below camp, so descent to South Lake was mostly by traverse and kick turn. They prudently skied around South Lake up to the parking lot and walked down the road to the Due to the east-facing slopes, this tour probably should be scheduled earlier in a "normal" snow year--if there really is such a thing! However, this was the first

2-day tour of the year that had 2 days of sunshine.

# ALPINE SKI TOUR, SAN JOAQUIN PRAN, MAY 20

Encountering continuous snow immediately after leaving the June Lake Loop road at 7400', the 5 participants carried skis up steep slopes, then skied across frozen Fern Lake (8880'), the normally willow-covered flat area beyond and up the steep cliffy area (most of the cliffs were buried by the deep snow) to the summit plateau for lunch. Summit (11,600) was reached by all by 2:15 pm for spectacular views of the snowy Ritter Range and surrounding peaks. Altho skies were cloudless, again a cold albewind kept the upper slopes crusty, but below 11,000' the Spring snow skiing was excellent right down to Fern Lake.

THE MUGELMOOS

On previous tours Fern Lake has been easily accessible by trail on foot carrying skis. Now, their ski descent route resembled the "Face" of June Mtn ski area before trees and rocks were removed and it was groomed into one of the 10 steepest runs in California (or is it the West?)! So, the upper part was negotiated mostly by traverse, kick turn and side slip plus one slide into the waiting arms of a young pine tree from which the skier extracted himself with difficulty. However, below 8400' a broad, open gully was encountered which again provided good Spring skiing, right down to snowline.

Riugelnoos has received an update on the status of the City of LA's Stony Point acquisition project from Laureen Cates, Co Chairperson of the Santa Susana Htn Park Task Force. The city planning department has approved the zoning for recreation open edd space. The Parks Dept is awaiting a title search and appraisal, following which the eef City can follow one of 3 options:

a) Offer to purchase the property for an amount up to the appraisal. 100.000 from last year's Proposition 2 is earmarked for Stony. If the appraisal is

over 100,000, other sources of funds could be sought.

b) Condemn the property.

c) Abandon the project. The future promises delays and uncertainties; the effect of Proposition 13 is unknown at this time. RCS members, especially those living in the Valley or the City of IA, should follow the project's progress and encourage Councilman Wilkinson, who is working for permanent availability of Stony.

Remember, building on Stony per se is not the main problem -- what we definitely face is eventual loss of access as private parties surround, fence off, and post the property. It can't happen here? Consider the fate of Eagle Rock, once the favorite RCS practice cliff. It's been off limits for years because the area property owners didn't want crowds, liability, etc. Let's not let Stony Point slip away like Eagle lockedid the slopes below theet were slied, on very bib chone

# of a ob digit , walking groupe book SMS CHAIRMAN RESIGNS beredomone ass

I am writing this letter to be published in the Mugelnoos stating why it is impossible for me to serve on the SMS Central Committee or as Chairman.

On a recent SAS trip 2 members of the section refused to se approved alpine equipment consisting of safety release bindings and climbers. The rules concerning the use of equipment on SAS trips have been specified by our Central Committee for safety and enjoyment of those on our section trips.

Normally a situation such as this would be simply resolved by the trip leaders not allowing the offenders to go on the trip. Unfortunately in this case, one offender was a key officer of the section and was able to use his position to convince the leaders it would be proper for him and his friend to use nonrelease bindings, not carry climbers, or not be able to attach their heels when skiing downhill.

When I attempted to obtain an explanation, this officer felt justified because he had done more than myself to bring new members into the section, which is true. His friend further stated I was just sore and couldn't keep up with her because I, and the rest of the section, were using heavy and obslete alpine equipment. Her statements can be excused because of her lack of experience on alpine skis and being a self-appointed missionary of nordic skiing.

The issue here was that an officer of the section violated our equipment and safety code. Even though both he and his friend may have been able to use nordic equipment safely, if less experienced skiers used this nordic equipment and were hurt on an official section trip, the SNS, the Sierra Club, the trip leaders and officers of the section could be put in a difficult legal position.

Last Fall our Central Committee considered merging with the Snow Touring Committee, which failed because of a lack of response from the Snow Touring Committee. This would have formed a new, stronger section, with qualified trip leaders and safety standards for both nordic and alpine touring. The officer involved in the equipment violation was the one who engineered this merger and when it failed, he evidently felt his best method of getting our section to use nordic equipment was to simply disregard our equipment code and force its use. A far wiser course of action would have been to discuss his feelings with the rest of the Central Committee. Because of the excellent past performance of this officer I am sure a way of qualifying nordic equipment for some trips could have been found.

Because of the possibility of being personally placed in a bad legal position by the improper use of equipment on section trips, and the disregard for our equipment rules by this officer, whom I can no longer effectively work with, I now resign from the Chairmanship of the SMS and its Central Committee. #### MT. RAINLER LAUSUIT SETTLED

According to the April MSR Newletter, the lawsuit opposing the severe use limitations imposed in 1973 has now been settled amicably.

a) All restrictions on the spacing of parties camping overnight in the rock-andice zone above 7,000° or on clacier snow and ice have been dropped.
b) Restrictions on the number of parties on climbing routes other than via Huir

and Schurman have been dropped.

c) Up to 35 persons may camp overnight in each of: Febble Creek to Camp Muir; Ingraham Glacier Flat (11,000); Inter Glacier.

d) During the off-season (Sept. 30 to July), overnight camping may be anywhere on snow, except in places of danger.

## BALDY '78 - THE BEAUTIFUL, LONELY SEASON!

That a fantastic season, skiing Baldy this Spring -- with virtually no company on the mountain at all. From all evidence, only a handful of ski mountaineers took advantage of the incredible smooth, deep corn snow this year. The aggregate snow-fall probably did not surpass the winter of '69, but most of this year's precipitation occurred late -- larch and April -- and the storms were comparatively warm (freezing level usually 6,000' plus), depositing enormous snow depths at the higher elevations on Mt. San Antonio.

This reporter skied from the Mut clear to the car as late as mid-April. The snow in the Bowl has never been better, reaching depths of  $k=5^\circ$ , and becoming skiable after the final Spring storm (first week of april). At the Hut,  $8k50^\circ$ , huge drifts transformed the entire landscape into a white wonderland. Where the creek runs near the Hut, the depth was actually measured at 150 plus. The final weekend of skiing was spent on June 10-11, when a six-foot wall of snow still bordered San Antonio Creek adjacent to the Hut. Hemorial Day skiing ves a delight, on continuous snow from the summit to below the Hut; that day the steep, lefthand side of the Bowl was a skier's dream -- like cruising down a field of tiny ball bearings! Well, maybe another year might compare to Baldy 178 -- but I doubt it!
