Check with the highway patrol or Caltrans for best approach routes, as these can cannge on a daily basis. Generally speaking, however, you can drive directly within 1/4 mile of the base of most climbs. Second, Equipment. Equipment for these climbs continues to be somewhat controversial, with authorities generally splitting into two camps. There are those who maintain that only the traditional equipment, such as Everdry Ropes, dirtons, mud hammers, dirt axes, scree screws, and locked-in boots are safe to use on this terrain. They would ban climbers who they feel have improper equipment. The other side of the coin is represented by those who feel modern climbing techniques and equipment (such as dirt slings and aluminum "finger-claws") have evolved in such a way that the use of such equipment not only slowes people down but also causes unsightly scarring. They feel that safety lies in going light and fast. They dislike the "Marking" of the routes which occurs, thus depriving future climbers of the thrill of discovering the route themselves. The Traditionalists, of course retort that the climbs by their very nature, are constantly changing, so that no route could be "marked". Further, they say that any scarring that might occur would be undistingushable from the surrounding terrain. The battle rages on between the "traditionalists' and the "innovators", with the clean' climbers chopping roots on some of the classic climbs, and the dirty climbers threatening legal action. This author does not claim to be able to judge which group is putting more artificial impediments between the individual and the experience nor to be able to mediate between the upholders of equipment standards and the light modern types only to explain the presence of injuction bearing marshalls at the trailheads. However, the uninitiated, if they listen closely, may be able to hear cohoes of the immortal words, "could't ve choost climb?"

A BIRD IN THE HAND -- BALDY COMES THRU AGAIN

Figuring a bird in the hand is worth two in the bush, eleven alpine skiers decided on April 19-20 that they had a known quantity right in their backyard: plenty of smooth, spring corn snow only an hour and a half's drive, plus a comfortable hut at 8500' level on dear old San Antonio (Mt Baldy). So they took advantage of this prospect, and payed off handsomely in what all participants agreed was the best spring tour of the 1080 season! Saturday the slopes under the Devil's Backbone were tried and the day ended with a climb to the summit of Mt. Harwood. This was newest SMS member Kurt Wedberg's (age 13) first ascent on skis. The Group was met on top by five members of the Sierra Madre Search & Rescue who spent the night there (without tents). The run down the steep chute to the Hut was the finest yet of ANY trip.

Sunday, several went to Baldy's summit (10,080'), finding it a bit windy and the summit itself too icy for comfort; however the run down the east slopes back to the Hut was the best downhill skiing anywhere. Short coupled linked S-turns all the way down Baldy's famous "ball bearing corn" capped off the mornings activities. After lunch the group climbed Marwood again, and repeated Saturdays glorious run down the chute to the Hut. They were down to the cars by 4PM and home for an early Sunday dinner. Of the trip's attendees, four were newcomers, end one old-timer (Harvey Hickman) showed up to Bemonstrate proper fundamental downhill technique to the admiring assemblage. (JW)

MINERAL KING SKI TOUR -- APRIL 26-67, 1280

Although Sunday was marred by clouds and wind, the group reached the major objective, Farewell gap, and the snow thawed into super corn, and everyone skied, telemarked, and skied some more over four miles and 2700 vertical feet.
