ACIA , DE BILLE BOO A LEADER MUST NOT FALL BIR BOO

It is always a pleasure to read the monthly issue of my beloved Mugelnoos. A seeming-ly frail reed, this little newspaper has weathered the vagaries of time better than many apparently sturdy trees (e.g. Life, The Saturday Evening Post, Colliers, Harpers) I was, however, shocked while reading the last issue to discover that so many of my fellow members of the RCS are getting themselves hurt. What's going on here? This is unacceptable. There shouldn't be any accidents. Yet this one issue chronicles five. It all argues a certain laxness, a lack of mental rigorousness, a want of relentless common sense. For these are the tools that insure a climbing holiday unmarred by mishaps.

I note that in the same issue Kent Withers avers his "faith in the system, the belayer, anchor, rope, etc.", because he took a leader fall and didn't get hurt. Thank God for that, and Ken is right to thank the RCS leaders for showing him the ropes. Only, the tone bothers me. Faith in the system or one's equipment is more likely to lead to danger than lack of faith. I say be suspicious, be critical, and keep your guard up. It is pretty unusual for me to preach about safety (as opposed to style and ethics), but I can't remain silent when members of my club are decimating themselves. So, Wake Up, RCSers. Rockclimbing and the sort of mountaineering involved in the accidents mentioned should be safe activities. The phrase "an almost accident-free weekend was enjoyed..." leads me to worry that accidents are becoming almost routine, and accepted as a normal part of climbing. Allow me to repeat myself: there should be no accidents. You should go into the field with that in mind and make sure you don't have any. It's not your equipment, and it's not your training, and it's not chance. In your start you have only yourself to blame.

When we step from a curb into the street we know we must look both ways. Every step in the mountains is like that step into the street. If we become mentally lazy while strolling across town and step off one curb without looking we have sinned against prudence. In the city that's unwise. And in the mountains too. So, in so far as I like my fellow club members to be whole and healthy, please resolve that "My fate is in my own hands, and as a favor to all of my fellow club members who want me to remain whole and healthy, I hereby resolve to stay that way."

The United States Consumer Product Safety Commission has been made aware of the potential danger, and, in cooperation with that agency, we request your assistance as source of technical mountaineering information in making climbers aware of this potential hazard.

IT'S PICNIC TIME AGAIN!



SMS CENTRAL COMMITTEE MEETING--September 9, 1980

This meeting was held at Kathy Crandall's house. (Kathy is recovering nicely from her accident, but her skull will remain bolted to her "halo" for 2' more months.) All members were present.

New Members: Sean Butler, Rick Campbell, Jackie Van Dalsem, and Dave Vandershaf were elected. (We will omit addresses for now since the new SMS membership list will be mailed soon.)

Snow Touring Committee Merger: Some members of STC have suggested that this question be reopened. After discussion the Central Committee decided unanimously that the real problem (failure of the SMS to allow Nordic skis) had been corrected and that a merger would be inappropriate. The Ski Mountaineers invite good skiers in the STC (those who can ski downhill) to join our section. But the Central Committee does not wish to compromise the section's original charter as an advanced skiing/mountaineering group, and it was felt that getting involved with lodge-based bus trips would inevitably deflect us from our main purpose. The Central Committee wishes to maintain friendly relations with the Snow Touring Committee, and will refer inquiries to them from people who seem interested in conventional cross-country skiing. (Members may wish to comment on this decision).

Safety Policy: As noted in the last issue, the SMS was asked to rewrite its safety policy to incorporate some of the chapter's rules. The committee reviewed a draft policy which provides that new ski tour leaders shall have passed the Ski Mountaineers Test. In practice the map and compass checkout will be given by LTC. Standard First Aid/Personal Safety and CPR cards will be needed to qualify. The two-day LTC lectures will be required. Those who qualify as SMS leaders will also get a chapter "I" rating, which is good for leading such things as Rabbit Peak and Mt. Sally (pray for snow). After approval of the final draft the new policy will be submitted to the chapter Safety Committee. OM

SMS BYLAWS, WHERE ARE YOU?

Having been retyped, they are again in the Chapter Council's in-basket. (The Council reviewers, meaning well, started to change some things which have been section policy since 1940 or earlier, but they did catch some errors.) The approval may seem slow, but the changes made by the Central Committee in early '39 were not approved by the members till October '39 and by the Ex Com until March '40. SKI TOURS FROM LAST SPRING-1980

OK all you skiers out there wake up! It's September, and Winter and those snowy slopes are just over the horizon and around the corner. What? You don't believe me, the signs are all around. Open your eyes and look, the newspapers are full of ski sale ads, ski magazines have their first issue on the stands, new skis have arrived in the stores, and there was a snow flurry in northern Montana last week.

To help get you in the mood, return now with me to the days of yore (last season) and that best of times, Spring skiing in California. Although those long and warm Spring days with consolidated ego snow were late in arriving to the Sierra, once all the ingredients came together it was the best ever. For example: May 4-10: Trans-Sierra II, With Dave and Susan Beck, Paul Rudder and Sam King, I skied past North Lake and on over Lamark Col. The endless turns down from the Col int Darwin Canyon can only be described as breathtaking, and most of it on good corn. (A condition which just continued & continued.) We skied down and around to Evolution Lake (lots of ski tracks on the Muir Trail) and then south to Muir Pass. We spent several hours skiing the local slopes at the Pass, and then pushed on over Black Giant Pass and into the Ionian Basin, a most marvelous and enchanting place to ski. After pausing for a day (of super skiing), we slipped around Mt. Goddard and experienced a dream run down to Martha Lake and on into Goddard Canyon. The remainder of the trip was more of the same and finally ended at Courtwright Reservoir after a crossing near Hell-for-Sure Pass.

May 18: San Gorgonio, Continuous snow from Slushy Meadows and almost to the very summ Skied perfect corn down the south slope for 500 feet, and then June Lane and I dropped off the lip of the Big Draw, past a giant crevasse, and then just endless turns. June 1: Wonder if there still is any snow on Baldy? Sure enough, for 2000' from the summit in all directions. I chose N.E. towards Lytle Creek. On the hike out I counte the turns, 138.

June 7-8: Fishermen migrate to Crowley Lake for opening day, for skiers (including J. Lane and Steve Hanson) it's Tioga Pass. We were half a day late, and the slopes were already tracked up! At the top of Mt. Dana the Yosemite locals said it was the first clear day in a month, and it looked like it. The views were similar to mid-wint but after the first 500 the snow was strictly super-Springtime corn all the way down. The next day was on nearby Mammoth Peak, and it can only be described as even better. Steep slopes, unbelievable snow, super views, and fine company.

June 29: The end is in sight, sun cups cover the slopes and only a few turns were possible below Bear Creek Spire. However, at Mammoth Mountain modern technology allowed fast and uncrowded skiing from the summit down to the main lodge. MG
