FROZEN SAND DUNE CLIMBING IN MICHIGAN Frozen sand dune climbing is enjoye by a baser lot who marvel at the wonder of massive sand dunes formir the shores of the freshwater ocean. On Lake Michigan, Sleeping Bear Dur has a 700 foot, 30-degree dune face that plummets to the watery edge in rapid fashion. In winter, this fac is wind swept and frozen solid with condensation. Walter Heninger died on Jan 5th at the age of 90, from complications resulting from pneumonia, after having undergone surgery. Walt was a long time resident of Southern Calif, and was active for many years in the DPS and 100 Peaks Sections, as well as the RCS and SMS. He could always be counted on to help in beginning rock climbing instruction at Stony Point, and his equipment lectures at RMTC. instruction at Stony Point, and his equipment lectures at BMTC were a highlight of the entire course, being laced with his marvelous humor and often punctuated with his patented gruff epitaphs.

No one knows how many hundreds of members he sponsored into the No one knows how many hundreds of members he sponsored into the Sierra Club, and was Angeles Chapter Membership Committee Chairman for many years in the late 40's and early 50's. "Heninger's Harem" was the name accorded the entourage of pretty young single girls who could be found on Walt's hiking trips. Many Sierra Clubbers found their eventual mates on one of Heninger's outings (including this reporter). Walt was Baldy Hut Manager for many years, and there's a section of the Hut trail dubbed the "Heninger Switchbacks", for the re-routing he constructed after the floods of 1938.

Old time Ski Mountaineers and Rock Climbers will miss Walt Heninger's leathery old face topped with snow-white hair and a tennis visor, and his avocados for lunch! Good-bye old friend, and God bless you!

RCS RETURNS TO OWENS RIDGE

Owens Ridge had not been scheduled since the early 1970s, so John Ripley and LeRoy Russ decided to lead a trip now that a guidebook is available. The climbing is on the east ridge of Owens Pk in the southern Sierra near Inyokern. It was first scheduled in 1957, but no guidebook was generally available until the China Lake Rescue Group brought out their little booklet in the mid-70s.

Our group camped 7 miles up the dirt road up Indian Wells Canyon, which leaves Hwy 14 just north of Homestead/Indian Wells (most slept Friday night at Powers Well, about 3 miles up the road). The camp, at about 5200 feet, is desert-like, with Joshua Trees and a few pinyon pines.

The climbing is across the canyon from this campsite. Trucks or brave cars can go up the road beyond our camp to farther campsites, and a trail contours from the end of the road to the rocks. This is a longish walk from our campsite, however. The direct cross-country approach worked from there, but the best route seemed to be to walk up the dirt road for a half mile or so to a jeep road that drops into the canyon near the base of the rocks.

The rocks are granite of variable quality in a semi-arid area 6000-6400 feet in elevation. They are numbered in the guide, most climbing being on rocks I & II.

The best climb done (as far as esthetic and rock qualities) seemed to be Dihedral on rock II, a two pitch 5.7 climb which can be descended using 3rd class and one 75-foot rappel down Direct Chimney. The following climbs seemed to be recommendable: Wednesday's Climb, Slate's Straddle, and Amphitheatre Jam (all on rock I). The following are not recommended: Rock I, Trough (loose), Rooftop (poor pro); Rock II, Arriba (poor rock and pro).

There are about 60 routes in the guide, and only a few were tried on our trip. Some felt the climbs weren't worth the approach (compared to other areas), but most seemed to feel that the area is worth an occasional visit. Virgil Shields explored the north side on Sunday and thinks a good trip could be made approaching from the north.

Those attending the November 7-8, 1981 climb were Stan Klein (Sat. only), Tom Jeter, Paul Morrill, John Peters (& the Mrs), Paul Harris, Margo Koss, Becky Levine, Mike Baca, Liz Berger, Virgil Shields, John Halcomb, Fred Clements, and Bob Caswell. The latter 7 plus Ripley went to Indian Wells Lodge on Sat night for dinner (excellent), returning to find a campfire going (raucous). Various refreshments were passed around, and a contingent kept the fire going until around 2 a.m. by burning large quantities of cow dung.

I RCS PROFICIENCY CARD POLICY

In proficiency cards are issued to students to enable them to climb the section until they become members, which we hope they all she to do. There has been no time limit on the cards. In recent years, are has been a trend wherein some students have completed the course, imbed a few times with the section, disappeared, then reappeared after long absence from section climbs and in some cases from all climbing. The iterion for renewal will be a minimum of four (4) climbs with the stion in the preceding year. Renewal cards will automatically be at to those who have made the four climbs. Former proficiency card holders who can't made four climbs or want to brush up on safety skills may talk the Safety Committee chairman, LeRoy Russ, about attending some actice climbs to renew proficiency. MT. WATERMAN SKI TOUR - JANUARY 9, 1982

For the first local SMS check-out tour of 1982, a large group of 12 skiers turned out. Participants included both SMS members and skiers on

their first EMS outing.

The tour followed the traditional route up to the summit of Mt. Waterman. Snow conditions ranged from ice to mush, but mostly breakable crust over a very thin layer of snow. Marginal at best. Eventhough Saturday was very clear and was very challenging to say the least. We did find a sunny slope of consolidated snow and paused to make a few turns and regain lost confidence.

Although the skiing was among the worst I have seen, everyone did agree that it was nice to be out amidst the pines.

In contrast, a private outing to Mt. San Jacinto on Sunday was totally different. After a nice lift up via the tram, we found several feet of firm but consolidated snow, excellent coverage, and then surprisingly it began to snow (a red sky in the morning was the only warning As a result of the storm, we got wet, skiing was super fast and smooth, and although we didn't make the summit, the run down was very memorable (in many different ways). A great day in the mountains with some real super people. super people.

STRIKE TWO

I joined Dennis Lopez and Doug Mantle this December for my second attempt on Aconcagua, the highest peak in the Western Hemisphere.

Doug and Dennis had preceded me by three weeks to do the standard boug and Dennis had preceded me by three weeks to do the standard tourist trek: Lake Titicaca, Machu Picchu, Iguassu Falls. I joined them in Mendoza, and from its inception, the facets of our expedition fell into place like the design of a Polish Rubic Cube, all six sides the same color: we obtained permission immediately, no stress EKG's required. Hours later, we met friendly Argentines who transported us to the Polish Glacier Route roadhead the next day after hosting us to their country's typical picnic, carne asado a la parilla (that translates into a barbeque). Summit day, I unroped several hundred feet above my last year's high point while the dynamic D's went on to bivouac twelve hours later on the summit.
