ON-GOING CRACK CLIMBING WORKSHOP

PROGRESS REPORT - OCTOBER 1987

Our six-month crack workshop got underway at Joshua Tree on Saturday October 3, with all 13 participants in attendance. After introductions and a kick-off meeting, we spent the day climbing the three major cracks at Conan's Corridor. All 13 participants successfully led Gem, a 5.8 vertical hand crack. Nine led Colorado Crack 5.9, and nine climbed Spiderman, a sustained 5.10a finger and hand crack. Several participants reported breakthroughs, thanks in part to the group energy and support. I am extremely pleased with our accomplishments on this first day.

Participants are: Tom Brogan, Ben Chapman, Dale Heuermann, Claude Lane, Pat Lysgaard, Mark Maier, Bob Oelsner, Deborah Rzonca, Greg Rzonca, Al Sanderson, Phil Thomas, Theresa Rutherford (Leader/Facilitator), and Jim Erb (Leader/Facilitator). Judged by the energy and interest demonstrated at the first session, this is an exceptional group, and I am sure we will exceed our stated goal of improving our crack climbing ability by at least two levels.

The framework of our six-month workshop is 48 of Joshua Tree's best crack climbs in the 5.8 through 5.10d range. The 48 climbs are divided into four groups of ascending difficulty called "Levels." Our goal is for most of the participants to lead six of the 12 climbs in Level 1, at which time we will turn our attention to Level 2, and so forth. As we meet the technical and physical challenges posed by increasingly difficult climbs, we expect our climbing ability to improve accordingly.

On Sunday, the day after our first workshop session, nine participants met at Jim and Theresa's home for a workout in their backyard climbing gymnasium and screening of contemporary climbing videos.

SUICIDE ROCK, SEPTEMBER 26 & 27

Keeping the tradition alive, this leader spent Saturday lazily lounging on this beautiful fall day. Meanwhile, eighteen climbers found their entertainment on the rock. Most ambitious were Jim Weger and Mike Loughman, some of the time accompanied by Harry Freimanis and Larry Tidball, as they did Nawab, The Plague, Hernia and Sword of Damocles. Scott Bailey did a nice lead on Surprise with Kris Hutchin and Ted Lewis following. The only unfortunate nappening of the day was a 60-70 foot leader fall (a slider) on Clam Chowder when the leader (a veteran climber) missed a traverse to the left above the first belay bolts. In retrospect he emphasized the impor-

tance of staying on route.

On Sunday I left the lounging to Scott as I spent an enjoyable day climbing with Newell Ackerman and Bruce Orenstein. Tony Bird returned to seek glory on the pages of Mugelnoos, climbing Johnny Quest and Flakes of Wrath with Jim Weger and Rich Lake. Although I didn't see them, Emery Yount and John Moore signed in and out, staying long enough to climb Breeze.
