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MUGELHUPF MOVIE NOW ON V.H.S!

The famous "Mugelhupf" (mogul jump) movie made by original SMS skiers in 1937 is now part of our archives.

The movie's director and star, Wolfgang Lert, was kind enough to allow the SMS to make a professional video transfer of the film for posterity. The video quality is excellent and far exceeds that of the "pirated" version videotaped directly off a projection acreen by Don "No Scruples" Pies.

The comedy has entertained several generations of SMS members and features hyjinks in and around Baldy Hut. The film's climax is a Keystone Cop-type chase scene where some 10 skiers pursue a solitary skier played by the handsome and dashing Wolfgang.

Yievers of the film are immediately impressed by the incredible skiing ability of the early SMS members. The skiers descend Baldy's summit at breakneck speeds, making lofty jumps and precise turns, and all on "primitive" hickory boards. Of course, many of the early SMS skiers were professional caliber, and Wolfgang was probably the best, winning, for example, the first four downhill races held on Baldy -- a 2 mile descent from the summit to the hut in little more than 3 minutes.

Wolfgang now lives in San Francisco and is the owner of a successful ski apparel import company. While no longer active with the SMS, he still receives the Mugelnoos and this correspondent has enjoyed several interesting conversations with him in recent years.

Fully titled "The Original Mugelhuph Movie. . . In the Good Old Knicker Days," the silent, black and white film is 17:30 in length and is being held by Peter Matulavich until a more suitable despository is established by the SMS. Mt. Gould - Onion Valley April 7-8

Six people showed up Saturday morning for this trip: Bill & Gisela Kluwin, Dana Pearce, George Holland, Pete Matulavich and Greg Jordan. Steve Hessen joined us on Saturday afternoon. The trail was dry most of the way to Gilbert Lake. However, we did have an interesting experience on the way. Although we had all heard the mating call of the forest grouse on spring tours, this was the first time we actually saw one. He was about the size of a chicken and about 40 feet up in a large pine. We camped near the inlet to Flower Lake, beyond Choinard City (another party with 4 Megamids). Saturday afternoon we toured toward University Peak and spent several hours skiing the bowls on the North side of the peak. The weather started to get bad and by the time we got back to camp, the forecasted snow showers had arrived in full force. It started to clear just before sunset, although we received a few more showers during the night. Next morning was clear with the snow from the early part of the storm consolidated and the latter part resulting in 2 inches of fresh powder. The new snow was welcome because it helped cover some of the barren spots on the way to Kearsarge Pass. We were able to ski all the way to the pass although there was poor cover in several areas. There were snow fields between the pass and Mt. Gould but not enough to ski, so we left our skis and climbed the peak (except for the summit block) on foot. We were down at the cars by 3:15. All in all a laid back trip, which could have used better snow cover.

Spring Break in Aspen, Colorado

April 8-14, 1990

The Chatsworth High School Ski Club, totalling 46, arrived Sunday afternoon at the Grand Aspen Hotel located a stone's throw from the Silver Queen Gondola at the base of Ajax/Aspen Mountain. Monday morning, we awoke to over two feet of new snow which had fallen magically overnight! A small group of 5 early birds met in the hotel lobby at 7:45 AM ready to ski and headed for the Snowmass ski area. My ski dream which is intimately, irrevocably tangled up with powder snow was about to come true! Skiing powder is another world, white on white, with stands of spruce and aspen decorated with big pillows of new fallen snow. First run, first tracks, and the weightless state as you float through the powder is something special, like wearing the Hope Diamond or your most incredible fantasy. As you ski down a wide-open field of untouched powder, each turn sends up a frosty white wave. Euphoria fills your heart. We mostly skied the Big Burn where the high-speed quad rises vertically over 2,000 feet in 8 minutes and where your thighs almost have enough time to recover from your last run which started at 11,835 feet and ended almost 8,000 "gasping-for-breath" feet later. It continued to snow throughout the day, and my prescription amber-colored ski goggles proved to be a wonderful investment. The sheer exhilaration of taking several runs in untracked powder before the crowds made it to the slopes was fantastic. Tuesday and Wednesday, the runs at Snowmass were groomed, which allowed everyone to ski faster and with a lot less physical effort. Thursday the clouds built again. This time, the sound of thunder announced the arrival of another milder snow storm. There were very few of us skiing the mountain in the afternoon as the temperatures dropped and the snow fall increased.

Friday, I skied Aspen Mountain as the snow fall continued throughout the day. Aspen Mountain has no trails for beginners or lower intermediate skiers and does not allow snowboards. Taking the Silver Queen Gondola, which rises 3,267 vertical feet and goes the length of 13,194 feet in 13 minutes, I arrived at the "Sundeck" in a white-out and decided to fortify myself with a cup of hot chocolate before beginning the first run of the day. Visibility improved; and after I got my blood circulating with a few runs on the intermediate terrain off Gent's Ridge, I tested my legs on Blondie and then the Summit. On the last and best run of the day, I lost over 3,000 feet as I skied the more than 2 miles from the top to the base of Aspen/Ajax Mountain. This Spring Break ski vacation was an exciting opportunity filled with fantastic skiing memories.



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
