FREE HEEL DOWNHILL CLINIC JANUARY 28-30, 2000

I got to the hut about 7:30pm on Friday night where Dorian Aniline was patiently waiting. We soon had the hut open and the wood stove burning. The rest of the participants continued to show up, one side benefit of no snow was that we could all find parking around the hut.

The next morning we were all out of the hut by 7:15am and at Bear Mountain before 8am. Again we luckily found parking in the upper lot near the main buildings. Using our Talk About radios. Reiner and I were soon able to make contact with Joe McCoy, who has distributed Talk About radios to all the Nordic instructors. Joe meet us at the Group ticket sales and quickly got us set up with lift tickets, clinic tickets and rental tickets for those who were renting. 



TWO EXCELLENT NEW BOOKS ON SKIING THE SIERRA NEVADA





Many of you are familiar w/ Moynier's earlier book of the same name published back in 1992. The text has been updated and expanded. The Peak descent section which had previously covered only 17 peaks now covers 60. The old maps, which were of little more use than to start a campfire have been tossed out in favor of some well drawn, easy to decipher versions. The new photos have much better resolution and convey the message w/ greater power. He has retained (and improved) the elevation /distance graphs that provide a lot of info on the terrain one is to expect. In short, the book is better in all respects than the very informative, if unpolished original.

The book starts out w/ a historical overview of the sport as practiced in the Sierra. There are sections on avalanche awareness, snow camping and equipment. Trips are rated for difficulty on a Class 1-5 scale and the reader gets directions to the trailhead (sometimes the most difficult routefinding of a trip) and through the regulatory hurdles.

The majority of the book describes longer tours. The Sierra Crest, south to north is divided into seven tours at logical trailheads. In the second section four trans Sierra trips are described. The third section discusses eight shorter less committed trips and the final section, peak descents (and ascents).

Richins book, as it's title suggests, has different coverage than Moynier's. In addition to the Sierrra Nevada we are provided sections on the Mt Shasta, Mt Lassen, and Lake Tahoe areas. There are no descriptions of extended "tours" but some of the individual peaks are remote and the round trip described can go to a week. Peaks for all ability levels are included.

Each chapter contains a regional map showing towns and access roads in sufficient detail to guide the backcountry skier to the trailhead of each featured trip. Trip write-ups include a summary of the route, 7.5-minute USGS topo(s) needed, trip duration, level of difficulty of the descent (intermediate, black diamond, double bd, extreme), mileage, elevation gain, a snowboard recommendation, snow conditions, and the best time to go. Also included are directions to the trailhead, a detailed description of the ascent and descent routes, and camping recommendations. Many of the trip descriptions include alternate ascent routes and various descent routes, and some suggest nearby summits with their approach routes. All of the approaches are given an "effort factor" which gives the estimated time based on an assumption of an hour for each two miles traveled and each 1,000 ft of elevation gained.

The appendix contains a wealth of info including listings of the peaks by difficulty, phone #s, and gear lists.
