Excelsior Mountain May 18-19th, 2002 by Reiner Stenzel

This report describes a fine ski mountaineering weekend in the eastern Sierra Nevada. The original plan of this joint SPS/SMS trip was to climb/ski Dunderberg and Excelsior. But Dunderberg was not skiable and no SPSrs "needed" it so we left it for another year. Instead, we attempted Leavitt Pk, only to be blown off the ridge by an incoming storm. Here are the details:

On Sat, 5/18, 6 am, a group of 10 participants met at the Virginia Lakes trailhead. These were R. J. Secor, assisting for Randall Danta who had a sprained ankle, Ted Lenzie from Sacramento, Jim Crouch and Ted Sledzinski from San Diego, Joy Goebel, Diann Fried, Leslie Hofherr, Chris Lohman, Maciek Malik and myself from the LA area. We hiked up the dry trail past the Virginia Lakes (9,800') and hit skiable snow above 10,000' near the Frog Lakes. Switchbacking up a great snow slope we left the trail where it descends northwest toward Summit and East Lke. We headed southwest toward a second ridge 0.5 mi northeast of Peak 12,126'. The east facing slopes had excellent snow coverage but on the ridge and on southwest facing slopes it was hiking time. After climbing a third slope we reached the 12,200' ridge north of Excelsior and scrambled up to the summit (12,446'). It was a pleasure to sign the register

SKIING THE STEENS

The Steens Mountains in Southeastern Oregon are a surprise to most people. Rising to above 9,000 feet with a snow covered crest extending for 40 miles; the Steens protrude impressively from the desert below. The range is a fault block, formed by an uplift, which resulted in a steep 5,000-foot high escarpment down to the Alvord Desert to the East.

For years, I had wanted to ski the Steens. From the West, a gentle loop road from the town of French Glen climbs to the south end of the crest. This road can be easily skied or as is more common in this area, traveled by snowmobile. But the total crest, extending from south to north, sees little activity. I found only one reference to a ski trip in the book "The Best Ski Touring in America" by Steve Barnett, published in 1987. But that effort did not follow the entire crest.

After several calls to the Burns BLM office and to Lou West, the owner of a private ranch at the south end of the range to get permission to cross his property, Armando Menocal and I drove to the Steens in mid-March 2001. We parked one of our vehicles at the north end of the range 40 ski miles from where we would start and then drove south along the good road that parallels the escarpment on the east. We drove to the ranch where Lou was kind enough to give us a ride in his truck to the end of the road. The elevation was 4400 feet. Armando's and my packs were 36 and 41 pounds respectively. We had enough food for 6 days. We carried our skis for about 2 miles but from that point on, we had continuous snow for the remainder of the tour. We skied north up Wildrose Canyon for the rest of the first day in poor visibility, but route finding was not a problem since the canyon was wide

and obvious. The 2nd day, the weather was worse, but we continued up a very steep headwall to above 9400 feet in whiteout conditions to within one half mile of the highest point of the range at 9723 feet. High winds and no visibility kept us from bagging the peak. Instead we continued along the crest, navigating by compass, occasionally seeing signs of the snow-covered loop road from the West. Night 2 was spent just before the crux of the trip, a traverse along a knife-edge ice covered ridge above Kiber Gorge, which needed to be negotiated to reach the more gentle Northern section of the tour.

When we woke on the morning of the 3rd day, the weather was better but it was still windy and cold. It would have required crampons and the better part of a day to negotiate this very technical ridge. Looking to the North, the snow cover was sparse which would have required a significant amount of walking at the end of the 40-mile route. So we bailed! We skied west following the loop road and the many snowmobile tracks toward the small town of French Glen. By the afternoon of day 4, we had reached the end of skiable snow and after walking for several miles; we were lucky enough to catch a ride with Mary, the BLM Ranger whom I had talked to via telephone several weeks earlier. She had been skiing along the loop road. She offered to give us a lift back to our car, which was a big help since our aborted route resulted in us being 50 miles by road away from the vehicle parked at the end of the trip.

The Steens Crest remains unskied. To finish the route will require a better than average snow year plus some technical gear to negotiate the knife ridge. It might be a great trip.

as the first group in 2002. However, judging from old ski tracks, others must have been on the summit without signing in. A cold wind blew over the top and we huddled in the rocks on the lee side. The views were superb: Blue Mono Lke, white Saddlebag Lke, endless snow slopes and peaks in Yosemite and further south. With some imagination we could see our fellow SMS'rs ski False White Mtn below us. By 1 pm we retreated from the summit and started our ski run down on mostly corn snow. A few places of unconsolidated snow did not stop the fun. But on the lower slopes the sunbaked snow was soft and balls began to roll and grow when turning. It was time to get off the slopes. By 3 pm we were back on the trail which disappeared from time to time under the snow. Another hour later we reached the cars, looking back at the nice slopes where we left many visible ski tracks. Everyone had enjoyed the day. Since brown Dunderberg was no match for the next day, we relocated to Sonora Pass with the goal of doing Leavitt Pk on Sunday. We camped just below the pass where Sardine Creek crosses Hwy 108. Happy hour, fondue dinner and a good Chardonnay made a fine end of the day.

On Sun we got up at 5 am, packed and drove up to Sonora Pass to start climbing by 6:30 am. The day started with a bloody red sunrise, high winds and low clouds over the ridge. A storm was forecast for Monday but seemed already on its way. Two participants joined in the last moment, Ruth von Rotz and Angel Ocana. We ascended the ridge on hard frozen snow which turned R. J. back. Only those with ski crampons could ski this snow. On the dry ridge it was hiking time. We proceeded along the ridge to Pk 11,245'. From there we could see Leavitt Pk (11,569') drifting in and out of the clouds. Since it was probably another 2 hours to the summit, dark clouds to the west indicated snow at any time, and we had lost one leader it was time to call it quits. We waited for the sun to soften the east facing slopes and enjoyed skiing the bowls below Pk 11,242'. The energetic team had several runs on eventually fine corn snow. More skiers came up to this popular telemarking terrain. We skied till noon, then packed up and went on our long drive home. High winds turned Owens Valley into a dust bowl. Thanks to R. J. for assisting again. We all had an adventurous ski mountaineering weekend.

The Harwood Lodge is currently in the process of updating their windows. As a result, they have reached out to the various Sierra Club Chapters, for donations to help offset the expense.



OBITUARY

SMS Member Norman Kingsley died 26 Aug, 2002. He and his wife had moved to Whitefish, MT but are still Mugelnoos subscribers.

NORMAN KINGSLEY, 72, was born on March 25, 1930, in Nuremberg, Germany, as Werner Kissinger. He survived Nazi aggression against German Jews via the Kindertransport in 1939, and lived in London and Lisbon, Portugal before emigrating to the U.S. in 1941.

He served briefly in the U.S. Navy, then enlisted in the Marines in 1948. He served with the 3rd Marines in North China, 5th Marines on Guam, and was picked to join the select 1st Marine Brigade under then-Brig. Gen. Ed Craig that turned the tide of the Korean War in 1950. He earned the Purple Heart, bronze and silver stars in Korea. He served as Presi-

dent of the Los Angeles regional chapter of the Marine Corps Combat Correspondents Association and was an active member for many years.

Norman owned and operated Tool Components International and Export Kingsley Company for 30 years, based in La Canada, Calif. He was an avid mountaineer, authored "Ice Craft," a comprehensive book on ice climbing in 1975, and passionately loved the outdoors.

He loved big-band jazz, good food and a cold beer after a long hike. He also recently taught personal financial management at Flathead Valley Community College.

He is survived by his wife, Anna-Lisa Kingsley of Whitefish; and his daughter, Gabrielle Kissinger, and son-in-law, Greg Kehm, both of Hallowell, Maine.
